development, but who, as I understand it, has been (until recently) shunned in requests to meet with the developer.

As I have already noted the project is on the market.

With or without a casino licence will probably remain so until the developer can find investors who will take on the construction risk.

It's worth noting too, that it's not units or property that is being sold, its part or all of the project. From where I sit, the probability that "investors" will stump up for this is very low. First, I am told that the original cost of \$650 million may (allegedly) have blown out to as much as \$2 billion.

A \$650 million project would need a return of around \$100 million per annum to make it worth looking at. A \$2 billion project would need a return of \$300 million. These are very big numbers set against an incredibly risky business plan. As a potential investor, I'm struggling to get there.

So here I am, demonstrably wedded to the fortunes of our region. I stuck my neck out saying that Kerry Packer would close the meatworks, if unions did not stop their rolling strikes. They did not, and unions blamed me when the meatworks closed. I set up a fee for service financial planning business and was told that competing financial planners were considering "sending a posse" round to deal with me.
