The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change warns the cost of keeping temperature increases below 2 degrees will double without the support of clean coal technology.

In this context, the Palaszczuk Government's commitment to a 50% renewable energy target by 2030 is extraordinary, especially in a state where the private sector is leading the way on clean coal.

This target is a 12-fold increase in Queensland's current renewable energy capacity.

Queensland's renewables experiment is in the vicinity of \$27 billion, which amounts to \$14,210 for every household in Queensland between 2016 and 2030.

Federal Energy Minister Josh Frydenberg warns

Queenslanders to have their candles and torches at the ready if the 50% target stays in place.

“Queensland has not offered any evidence that its unrealistic 50 per cent renewable energy target can be met without compromising energy security or without driving up power prices.

“While a lower emissions future is undoubtedly important, it counts for little to the public if they are sitting in the dark.

“We cannot trade away the reliability of the system as we transition to a low-carbon future because to do so would be far costlier in the long run.”

South Australia, which suffered another blackout in Adelaide this week, has already shown what happens when ideology drives the race to unrealistic renewable energy targets.

Queenslanders must demand their energy future is based on rational policy decisions that protect jobs, ensure supply and keep prices in check as the nation transitions to a clean energy future.
