The Dauphin Map depicts Wilsons Promontory as a group of islands; which they would be if the sea level was four metres higher.

Sydney Harbour is shown much larger than it is, which it would be if sea level was higher.

There are numerous places on the Queensland

coast that indicates that sea level was much higher 'sometime' in the past.

I took the attached photograph at high tide. This island is in the Swains reef group.

It is easy to see that the east coast of Australia has experienced Climate Change in the past.

The frightening realisation is that the four metres different is between 1522 and 1770, just 250 years.
